5. Report on Academic and Student Affairs Committee Meeting Held March 14, 2023:

Chair Fryar reported that the Academic and Student Affairs Committee met on March 14, 2023. He moved that the actions of the Committee be approved by the Board; Trustee Eichler seconded the motion, and the following resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the University of Arkansas desires to manifest publicly and enduringly its profound esteem for Coach Louis Whorton, and its deep appreciation for Coach Louis Whorton's many contributions to the Westark Community College, now University of Arkansas – Fort Smith; and

WHEREAS, the Board hereby recognizes Coach Louis Whorton for his 30 years as the Women's Basketball Coach at Westark Community College and the University of Arkansas – Fort Smith, in which he built a dominate women's basketball program that rivaled any four- or two-year institution around the nation; and

WHEREAS, Coach Louis Whorton won 648 games which includes nineteen 20-win seasons and six 30-win seasons, which makes him the all-time winningest basketball coach at Westark Community College and University of Arkansas – Fort Smith; and
